 - 8 Associate Professors (Druzdzel, Flynn, He, Krishnamurthy, Munro, Pelechrinis, Spring, Zadorozhny)
 - 2 Assistant Professors (Farzan, Lin)
 - 3 NTS Professors (Babichenko, Mitchell, Perkoski)
 - Mai Abdelhakim starting in December
- High correlation with former DIST
- Strong affinities to both CS and IC&DS

Principal initiatives

- Consciously invent ourselves and not remake DIST
- Increase research orientation
 - Double down on already strong research productivity
 - LISR paper shows that 5 of the top 10 most productive researchers are DINS faculty members
 - Reputation and rankings are based on research
 - Move toward three courses per year for research active faculty
 - Build procedures that allow faculty to increase time and attention on research and teaching
 - Move away from heavy reliance on tuition revenue
- Create culture of decisionmaking based on data
